


which created welcoming atmosphere. People working in the Youth House are authorized to help youngsters in difficult situations of their lives, they can advise what is more profitable for them.

We couldn't wait to see the city of Porto, a city declared as World Heritage by UNESCO, with its fascinating history and exceptional atmosphere. We had a great opportunity to experience both visiting House of Music, Bom Sucesso Market and the Sandeman Wine cellar.





Designed by Rem Koolhaas, an architect from the Netherlands, Casa da Musica or House of Music in Porto was built as a part of the works done to welcome the European Culture Capital initiative and soon become an iconic city symbol. The main auditorium, shaped like a simple shoebox, is

enclosed at both ends by two layers of glass walls. The glass, corrugated for optimal acoustics and sheer beauty, brings diffused





daylight into the auditorium. The folded glass curtains allow for slightly distorted views of the city. One of the rooms in the building has pale-blue tiles with religious themes on its walls, commonly found in Portuguese churches. And another is soundproof with walls covered with

green sponge. All the visitors were greatly impressed by exquisite architecture and acoustic capacity of this marvellous building.

After this visit we had a free time. With our Portuguese friends we visited the city and had dinner.

One can't imagine Porto without tasting porto wine. Next aim of the trip around Porto was the Sandeman wine cellar, one of the first companies to brand and label its wines. Dressed like a Spanish caballeros, our guide led us through the cellar corridors uncovering secrets of producing this noble drink. He showed us huge barrels with fermenting wine and the oldest vintage wine bottled and stored on special shelves behind bars. The history of Sandeman company he told us was fascinating. At the end of our excursion everybody could taste Porto wine. We had a sip and I must admit it was a strong one.
